

# Mrs. John B. Danese Named Warwick 'Woman Of Week'

A former Woonsocket resident, Mrs. John B. Danese of 92 Shand Ave., Warwick, the former Rita Charest, who left Woonsocket with her husband and son in 1963, was given the title last Wednesday by Mayor Philip W. Noel in his office, where she displayed many of her woven, knitted and sewed creations.

She also showed Mayor Noel the 25 blue and red ribbons she won at the recent Brockton Fair. Mrs. Danese said she believed they were the first ribbons awarded to a Warwick resident in the 95-year history of the fair.

The winning pieces of handicraft included a crocheted tablecloth, blue ribbon; two sweaters, blue and red ribbons; crocheted centerpieces, blue ribbons; yarn hooked rug, red ribbon; picture hooked rug, red ribbon; braided rug, meritorious award; baby set, blue ribbon, and crocheted hat, blue ribbon. She also entered floral arrangements and cut flowers.

Mrs. Danese said today she plans to enter her work at the Rocky Hill Fair. "Being named 'Woman of the Week' is one title I am very proud of. After having left school in the eighth grade, I think now that time is very precious and that is why I am always studying. I never was taught how to do this kind of work. I learned from books."
